THE 2002 NATIONALS, RACE BY RACE THE RUGGS, FATHER AND DAUGHTER, REPEAT

Fishers Island's own Caroline and Peter Rugg co-skippered Pegasus to victory in the 41st Bullseye Nationals held this year at Fishers Island on the weekend of August 3-4. In so doing they won the cherished E. L. Goodwin Trophy, as well as a special first place prize, a painting by Charlie Ferguson from Fishers Island. Their victory was an exact repeat of their 1997 triumph at Fishers.

From the Beverly Yacht Club (Marion), Wendy Goodwin and her dad Gordon won second place honors guiding Red All Over to a 4,2,3 and 10 record. Third place was won by the Nuttings, Phil, Cheryl, and Tyler, from Rockport in Dream Days. Another Rockport boat, Whisper II sailed by Connie and Peter Lavigne came in fourth and fifth honors went to Dede and Beau Plessner, skipper and crew of Lazy Bonz, hailing from Buzzards Bay Yacht Club. The Rockport Prize went to Wendy Goodwin for having the best record for a boat from "away" and the Beverly Award for "most improved" since the previous Nationals was won by Cal Beggs from Fishers Island. Caroline and Peter Rugg, in addition to their first place prizes, received the perpetual Fishers Island trophy, a painting by Charlie Ferguson, for the best Fishers Island finish in the Nationals.

This was a four-race Nationals, the beautiful Saturday weather allowing three races. Sunday, on the other hand, was glassy calm until about 1230. The breeze sprang up just in time for one race. Lacking a fifth race, there were no throw outs.

The first race was a windward / leeward twice around course in a light

Twenty Bullseyes were registered for the 41st Nationals at Fishers Island the first weekend of August, though two were unable to participate. Ten came from off the Island.

On Friday afternoon, the visiting boats were launched at Spicers Marina in Noank, CT, and towed the two and a half miles across Fishers Island Sound to West Harbor. Many thanks to Sandy Riegel and Harris Parsons for the towing.

After registering at the Yacht Club the visiting sailors were put in touch with their hosts who came to pick them up. Cal Beggs presided magnificently and flawlessly over sail measuring. That evening all participants and their hosts enjoyed a convivial and delicious reception hosted by Peter and Meredith Rugg at their new home overlooking West Harbor.

A Race Committee headed by former Nationals champion, Charlie Van Voorhis, assisted by Kevin Farrar and Liz Burnham met with all contestants at the Skippers' Meeting at 0830 Saturday. Mike Posey kindly invited spectators on board his sloop True North.

The first gun was fired shortly after 1000 and two races were successfully run before the flotilla returned to the Yacht Club for lunch. At 1400 the fleet was back at the starting line ready for the afternoon race.

When the racing was completed, all boats headed back to the Yacht Club. After refreshments and chatter on the lawn, the sailors retired to quarters to relax and prepare for the gala dinner at the Hay Harbor Club. The highlight of the evening was a video of the day's racing presented by Sarah Porter and Geordie Loveday.

Everyone was so mesmerized by the spinnaker sets, some slightly comic, others of America's Cup quality, that Dave Burnham, Master of Ceremonies, had to shut the tube off to get people settled for dinner.







Chris, got off to a perfect start and <u>Celtica</u> led the fleet around the course. The Ruggs were in 10th place at the first mark but worked their way up to second by the end of the third lap and maintained that position. Connie Lavigne finished third, Wendy Goodwin came in fourth and Tom duPont with his son-in-law, Eric Thiel, finished fifth.

The second race was held in a slightly stronger breeze and the course was triangle /windward / leeward / windward. Some boats were over the line early including Celtica which did not get the message until she had gone upwind a couple of hundred yards and then had to set her spinnaker to get back to the start. The Ruggs won this race handily followed by Red All Over, Mark Cohen and Jan Walker in Tradewynde, the Lavignes in Whisper II and the Nuttings in Dream Days. The fleet then sailed in for lunch.

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The third race of the day was also triangle / windward / leeward / windward. The wind was more to the west and the overall course a little longer. Once again, Pegasus showed her heels from the start though Dede Plessner and Beau nipped at them from time to time guiding Lazy Bonz home to second place. Next came Red All Over, Celtica, Dream Days.

Sunday morning the fleet crawled to the starting line on the last whispers of a northerly and everyone was ready for the first gun at 9:30. But then there was no wind at all for three hours. Most boats anchored, many rafted, and numerous swimming parties took place. An abundance of sunscreen was poured over parched epidermis.

The Sailing Instructions had proclaimed that no race would be started after 1300. Those hoping for one throw out had long since given up that dream when the one race of the day began at 1230. It commenced with a daring and

successful port tack start by Charlie Ferguson and Tim Patterson in Osprey. Charlie was second at the windward mark just behind Celtica, dropped to third at the second mark behind Dream Days and Shamrock, then rose again to first for both the third and fourth legs. It was a great race for the Island's favorite artist. Whisper II was the chief stalker on those last two legs earning a strong second place followed by Dream Days, Shamrock, and Peregrine.

In the final standings it should be noted that the second local boat was Brad Burnham's <u>Peregrine</u>. Brad and grand-daughter Sofie Malinowski were always in the upper echelons with finishes of 8,7,7, and 5. With all due respect to the Ruggs and this pair of Burnhams, it must be acknowledged that the foreign invaders gave most of the locals some good sailing lessons. Their accomplishments were all the more noteworthy in that they adjusted so well to the strong currents of Fishers Island Sound.
