# WENDY GOODWIN, NATIONAL CHAMPION

Wendy Goodwin and her father Gordon of Marion, MA, won the 43rd Bullseye Nationals hosted by the Sandy Bay Yacht Club in Rockport, Massachusetts, the weekend of July 23, 24, and 25. The champions won decisively—two good wins and two seconds for a total of 6 points. Second place went to Dede and Beau Plessner who, with 15 points, narrowly nipped Association President Joan Tiffany and husband Ed with 16.

Race #1 took place in atypical Rockport conditions. It had begun to rain in the early morning with a strong northerly wind. By the time the boats left the harbor it was blowing 15 to 18 and the rain made for poor visibility. Most boats left the harbor early and

despite foul-weather gear everyone was pretty soaked before the Committee Boat got settled and fired the first gun. The course was a simple windward/leeward to a mark due north about a mile away. The Committee boat end was favored in this race and boats that stayed out in the middle fared better than those that played the shore. This was the only race of the weekend when this strategy proved best. Judging the layline proved difficult as a fairly strong current pushed boats to the left. Once the mark was rounded the Goodwins' Red All Over, already in the lead, successfully set a spinnaker. Michael Taylor in Aldebaran made the attempt but never got it flying. Others did not risk a set in the gusty conditions. Wendy won going away followed by George Fenner from Card Sound, Florida sailing Lou Molina's old Mistress, the Tiffanys in Cove Girl, Fishers Island's Cal Beggs in Mistral, and the Plessners' Lazy Bonz.

With wind, rain and chop steadily increasing, the Race Committee

found it impossible to keep an anchor on the bottom and cancelled racing for the rest of the day. Not a single, soggy, chilled sailor complained. The next race was to a warm shower. On shore one host's anemometer reported the wind between 20 and 22 with gusts up to 28.

Sunday dawned rainless with a breeze of about 14-15 and gradually thinning cloud cover. The first race was windward / leeward twice around. Dave Burnham got Querida, which won the Nationals the year before, into the groove, and led from the start through the

The remarkable fifty-year history of the Bullseye will be a part of the considerations. The protection of the one design quality of the Bullseye is a primary responsibility of the Association with the ultimate goal to continue to make racing a Bullseye fun and fair. If you have an interest in working on the specifications or otherwise helping with the Association or on fleet leadership, please be in contact.

It is a great pleasure to work with all of you Bullseye sailors! Even more fun is having the chance to sail in such good competition with others clearly enjoying themselves. The season is too short in New England - so hope to see you at Card Sound!

#### THE 2005 NATIONALS

Linda Noble, Commodore of the Card Sound Bullseve fleet, has invited members of the Bullseye Association to participate in the 2005 Nationals to be held in Key Largo, Florida, on Friday, March 4 and Saturday, March 5. Everyone is encouraged to arrive on Thursday, or sooner, for launching and practice racing. Sunday will be the day for farewells and reloading visiting boats.

Cape Cod Shipbuilding is looking into costs for trucking boats to Florida. For the 2000 Nationals at Card Sound two boats were towed down on their owner's trailers and six went by truck. At that time the trucking fee was \$1000 for each boat. Wendy Goodwin's best efforts so far have yielded a price of \$1660. Hopefully this will not deter northern skippers from giving their boats some Florida sunshine. However, Linda Noble says she is guite sure there will be five or six boats available for those who do not wish to bring their own boats. Stay tuned for more details in the next issue.

(Therefore, my sail identification, B5.) As you know, the yard has often been helpful in launching boats when nationals have been held in Marion.

The photo shows what Barden's boat yard, also in Marion, chose as a decoration for one of their main buildings — it's a real Bullseye hull cut in half! I haven't heard how or why they did this, nor have I heard any comment about whether this was a good thing or what happened to the other half.

first two legs but was passed by the wily Wendy on the next upward leg proving that going to the left close to shore was the way to go this day. Wendy finished well ahead for her second bullet of the series. Querida followed. Then came the Cranberry Isle's Aldebaran, followed by Rockport's own Walter Luikey in his smooth-bottomed beautifully restored Templar. The steady Tiffanys steered Cove Girl to 5th.

The second race of the day was a single windward / leeward in slightly lighter air, still from the north, and clearing conditions. Boats that went to the left as long as possible dominated. This may have been because surface conditions were better on port tack further out. Everyone found the port tack challenging, demanding absolute concentration to retain speed in the dying wind conditions. Dede Plessner mastered the situation best of all, finishing first followed by the Goodwins, Tiffanys, Cal Beggs, and Walter Luikey.

At this point the Race Committee, as the air continued to die, chose to post an Olympic course though there would have been time for two more short races allowing contestants to have a throw out. The two Fishers Island boats attempted port tack starts. A good idea! The space was there! Start on port and immediately flip to starboard and lead the pack

towards the shore! But—Querida mistimed it, and blocked Mistral. To Cal Beggs' credit he got back in the race better than Dave Burnham, finishing 9th to the latter's 12th. Those who succeeded best in this long, drawnout race with the wind falling to 5 knots were George Fenner (1st) recovering his form after two poor middle races, the Goodwins (2), Dede Plessner (3), Walter Luikey (4), and Joan Tiffany (5).

The Awards Ceremony took place in the Sandy Bay Clubhouse after most of the visiting boats were back on their trailers ready to roll over the highways. Wendy Goodwin (1-1-2-2) received the first place prize and also, of course, the E.L. Goodwin perpetual trophy, named after her grandfather who began making modern fiberglass Bullseyes in the early 1950's. The second place prize went to Dede Plessner (5-6-1-3) followed by Joan Tiffany (3-5-3-5). The Beverly Trophy for the Most Improved went to Cal Beggs (4-17-4-9) a great recovery after his "deep" swamping in Marion the year before. The Goodwins also won the Peter Vincent Award, which goes to the boat from "away" which does the best in the Nationals. It is Peter's etching of Beaver II, when she was owned and raced by George Warren Smith, a now deceased, and much loved Bullseye guru of the 70's who hailed from Rockport. Beaver II is now Emily Wick's boat.
