2016 Bullseye Nationals at Card Sound

The 2016 Bullseye National Regatta, with 24 boats on the line, looked rigged for the host club, but only at the end of the first day of racing on Card Sound, April 8th, at the Ocean Reef Club, North Key Largo, Florida.

Steve Streit, with his dad Chris on the chute, from CSSC, won the 10 a.m. race right from the start in light, shifty winds. After he rounded, most of the visitors (and some locals) ran into a road-block at the windward mark when a host boat, stalled by the current went into irons, unfortunately causing some bumps and 360s and forced Niko to jibe around to make the mark. A visiting skeptic might have been unfairly suspicious. Then the wind disappeared and the red and white postponement flag went up. After an hour or more of drifting, the abandonment flag was hoisted and boats were towed in. The beach bar at Buccaneer Island did a booming business for the Club.

The Race Committee of Loren and Natasha Price, Jane Schaefer, and Shirley Shumway with lots of experience on Long Island Sound, and Tom Snyder from Lake Geneva, had seen plenty of glassy calms growing up, but a dead calm is rare in the Keys. To no-one's surprise, including the committee's, as soon as the boats were de-rigged in the harbor, the breeze came up for the afternoon. But it was too late. Only one race was finished, but lots of sun and warm weather prevailed, as advertised.

Day two brought ideal racing conditions, 10 to 15 knots; the R.C., with some timely shifting of lines and marks, gave us five good races, with each one long enough for many place changes on each of three legs. With each race, the decision for going to the right or left side of the course was not clear, and first place finishers came from both sides but from only two boats, the Streits and past Nationals' Champion, Niko Kotsatos, BYC, with his fiancée Carolyn Marsh as crew.



The rest of the fleet, which included three Nationals' past champions, Sallv Martin, CSSC, Peter Rugg, FIYC, and Chris Collings, BYC, all had their share of up and down finishes. Of particular note in Race 1 were the Tiffanys with a 2nd, followed by Rugg and Soper with a 3rd, and Jack Lampman and Jane Rew with a 4th. Race 2,

again the Tiffanys with a 3rd, favored local Gary Sayia and Nancy Lampman in 4th. Race 3's double-shout-out was for Dick Elliott and Larry Askew's 2nd and Ed and Sandy Kirschner's 3rd place. Commodore Dan Harding with Cyndee Swenson showed can-do by grabbing a 4th in Race 4, and Race 5's 2nd place went to the Collings (with steady improvement) followed by George Lucas and his son Russ in 3rd.

The last race of the regatta, Race 6 (which allowed one throw-out of a throw-up finish), was a nail biter. By then, Niko had three 1sts and a 2nd, and Steve had two 1sts and a second. Under pressure, Steve and his dad won the last race, but Niko's 3rd was good enough to take Top Honors. The Streit team was a close Second (by 1 point).

Chris and Kathryn Collings' 2nd s in the last two races and drop gave them a Regatta Third, slipping the Lucas team to Forth, and the Tiffany team climbed the podium for Fifth Place.

The next five places, all from CSSC were: 6th, Jack Lampman and Jane Rew, 7th Gary Sayia and Nancy Lampman, 8th Ed and Sandy Kirschner, 9th Cmdr Dan Harding and Cyndee Swenson, and 10th Sally and Bill Martin (breaking a tie with Winsor and Erin Coffin, our hosts for next year's Nationals at Winter harbor).

The opening Welcome supper was graciously held at the home of Nick and Marlene Csendes with a sunset view over the Sound. The Ocean Reef catering team furnished delicious Friday night buffet near the harbor on the ocean side and a special awards dinner Saturday night.

Before the awards were announced, we had a moment of silence honoring the loss of George Fenner for this year's Nationals, joining Dave and Ann Burnham and Emily Wick as sorely missed long time perennial leaders of the Bullseye Class.

The six race-winner photo plaques were split between Niko Kotsatos and Steve Streit with three Firsts each.



Niko and Carolyn won the prized E. L. Goodwin Trophy and the Rockport Trophy, the framed humorous etching for the top finish by a visiting skipper and crew.

An equally boisterous cheer went up when the Beverly Trophy for "Most Improved", calculated by a complicated formula run by IBMs Watson, was announced for Ed and Sandy Kirschner. Ed had spent countless hours and dollars for many months getting ten "loaner boats" in top racing condition. His communications

matching visitors to the boats was also extraordinary; so it was a very timely award, but won on the race course.

This is just one of the many traditions that make the Bullseye design and Class special.

Annual Meeting May 1, 2016

This year our Annual Meeting was preceded by a visit to the New Bedford Whaling Museum. With a personalized tour, the Bullseyes had a chance to see the best of this lovely museum including the half scale model of the whaling Bark *Lagoda*. The group then enjoyed lunch and the business meeting at Beverly Yacht Club.

President Kym Lee called the meeting to order. The minutes of 5/3/2015 were approved. The BSA currently has 93 members.

Treasurer's report: Treasurer Ed Tiffany reported that the BSA is in good financial shape. While our expenses for 2013 and 2014 exceeded income, in 2015 income exceeded expenses. Office expenses were about \$600. There will be expenses for the transition to the GoDaddy website whose contract runs to 2026 on very favorable terms. Insurance is a significant expense but would give some protection to officers if someone sued the Association in a National Regatta.

President's Report: President Lee gave a hearty thank you to CSSC for hosting the 2016 Nationals with 24 boats on the line.

Lee announced that the Buzzards Bay Regatta, 8/5-8/7 will have a special circle for H12s and Bullseyes, and we are all invited. Bullseye fleet members will host any out-of-towners, and they hope to have some loaner boats. Registration is \$65.

Lee is also looking forward to changes that would allow us to register for regattas on line. Getting more out there in electronic media will encourage younger sailors.

One vote was cast for the slate. Joan noted that we still have not found anyone to assume the role of Historian. The BSA is also looking for an additional person in the Technical Committee and another high tech person who could move the BSA forward on social media experiments.

CSSC is requesting \$1000 (in addition to the \$500 already received) to offset their \$4000 loss during the Nationals. Discussion showed that Fishers Island had received \$500 initially plus about \$900 for launching boats. SBYC returned the \$500 it was initially given. In the future, a club should request the funds in advance. However, the BSA wants to help clubs improve racing. The request was approved.

Chris Collings proposed the idea of adding a single handed event to increase interest in racing. Wendy suggested that it could be similar to a Shields event: bring your own sails, and the winner hosts the following year. Chris will send out a survey and lead the effort this year.

President elect Ed Kirschner invited all sailors to come down to CSSC to sail at any time. President Lee presented Ed with the President's trophy to keep for his term of office. The President Lee was surprised by a gift of an antique lawn chair and a promise of a photo of her boat in the near future as thanks for a job well done.

Safety issues at the 2016 Bullseye Nationals

Getting back in the boat:

In the 2nd race, Dick Elliott went swimming to free the spin sheet from the rudderpost. He did make it back aboard after his crew formed a loop from the main sheet and he rolled onto the deck. He is a senior citizen, but is a regular at the Fitness Center. He was exhausted, but mad enough to come in 2nd in the next race, his best. So we can take that experience as "a near miss" of very serious incident or as a good race tactic. Let's assume the former.

The week before, I had plopped over the side on the way back to harbor, showing off hiking by holding onto the vang tail which popped out of the cleat. I had my life preserver on, so not a crisis, but I could not get back into the boat and had to be picked up by a ready patrol boat with swim ladder. I am senior to senior Dick Elliott, and do not go to the gym.

I tried to use a lanyard supported plastic step that Chris Collings recommended to me five years ago, but I had anchored it too far onto the bulkhead so that it dangled too high up to be of use to me. Lesson 1- Carry a boarding step aboard. Lesson 2- try it out in the harbor before you need it.

Chris Collings uses this Perko step after scrubbing his bottom at the mooring, it is available at West Marine for about \$25 and takes very little space and is very light weight. Chris has suggested that either we strongly recommend it or make it mandatory safety item as a Class.

The CSSC Bridge has already followed that recommendation. Here is a photo:



Anti-swamp buoyancy bags reminder from Nationals 2010:

We apologized to the Nationals visitors for some of the loaner boats that had not yet been fitted with air bags, and some of our regular boats are still waiting to have the bags installed due to inertia and lack of time by retired folks. But our CSSC policy was reconfirmed at the last Bridge meeting to "strongly urge installation of the added floatation as tested at CSSC".

The incidence of swamping is rare, about once every 4 or 5 years; and those cases that lead to sinking due to leaks in the tanks are even rarer. But, at the least, they are a mess and require a patrol boat nearby to assist which may cause the end of the fleet's racing for that day. In

cold weather or cold water the case is much worse. At the extreme, which happened the night before the 2010 Nationals at Card Sound, a sinking happened in a remote area that could easily have ended with the loss of two sailors. We have since learned that this risk is easily prevented.

The current built-in floatation tanks were designed to a standard of the 1950s before self-rescuing floatation became the current standard for small boat sailing. The air tanks, when tight, only float the boat awash, with often the need to dive down to free the sails to allow righting (as in Wendy's story on the web site). Then you need assistance to tow and are out for the day. Yes sailors are macho and call it an adventure, but why take this unnecessary risk?

With a severe heel, the floor tanks are on edge, not adding buoyancy where needed. The water comes over the combing, sliding the boat under; she loses the righting moment of the keel. By having floatation under the seats or side decks and bow and stern, as Captain Nat built in 1938 for Fishers Island with wood and copper, the mast pops back up and the hull floats the boat with water below the seat level so that two crew can bucket her out, walk around the decks, and continue to sail the next race or sail home.

The air bag kit costs about \$400, less than a Tack-tic, and only takes an hour or two to install. Click on "hints" from the web page, make your own, or go to http://coliesail.com/bullseye-buoyancy-kit.html to order. GBL
